Recycling Extravaganza Huge Success

On Saturday, April 28, the Village's Environmental Commission held a Recycling Extravaganza in the Duane/Lorraine parking lot. Approximately 250 vehicles dropped off recyclables for this successful event — an increase of 150 vehicles over the last such event held here. The following items were collected:

- American Flags: 45 flags
- Ink jet/laser cartridges: 30 units
- Eyeglasses: 198 pairs
- Cell phones: 246 phones
- Scrap metals: 30-foot dumpster — 2 tons
- Outdoor tools & equipment: 144-foot semi-truck
- Books: 1/2 truckload
- Salvation Army: one 20-foot truck
- Fire extinguishers: 25
- Hearing aids, plastics, records and ties

Many books were rescued as well in the book exchange.

Overall, the 2007 Glen Ellyn Recycling Extravaganza was a big success thanks to the help of many different volunteers and organizations and the Environmental Commission extends its appreciation to the Glen Ellyn Kiwanis Club, the Glen Ellyn Lion's Club, Kiwanis of Central DuPage, the League of Women Voters, S.C.A.R.C.E. and a local Boy Scout Troop.

Intergovernmental Agreement with COD for \$280 Million Master Facilities Plan

The Village of Glen Ellyn's Comprehensive Plan calls for cooperation and support of College of DuPage as "a major community amenity and attraction." To honor this commitment, the Village has entered into an intergovernmental agreement with the school for oversight of its new \$280 million Master Facilities Plan. That Facilities Plan includes major projects at COD, including the construction of three new buildings, the demolition of some of the existing temporary structures and reconfiguration of the school's internal roadway system and parking lots.

The College of DuPage campus comprises more than 254 acres located on the east and west sides of Lambert Rd., west of Park Blvd. and south of Fawell Blvd. As part of the agreement, the Village will oversee plans for the various stages of work at the school. Clearwater Program for Illegal Sump Pump Connections

Cost-Sharing Program Ends Sept. 30



The Village's Clearwater Removal Program is designed to reduce the amount of clearwater entering the sanitary sewer system and cut down on instances of sewage backing up into basements.

Selling Your Home?

The Clearwater Program primarily affects homeowners whose sump pumps discharge water into the sanitary sewer system. These connections are illegal and must be corrected under the program. For example, a typical 8-inch sanitary sewer main can handle wastewater from approximately 460 homes, but will be overloaded if only 12 of those homes have sump pumps operating at full capacity and discharging into the sanitary sewer. The result: sewage backups in basements. To limit these problems, the Village has initiated an inspection program at the time of the home's sale. Under the program, any illegal sump pump connection must be corrected before selling your home.

If you are selling your home, you should call Public Works at 469-6756 up to three months before the date of title transfer

to set up an inspection of the home plumbing system. The purpose of the inspection is to determine if an illegal sump pump connection exists. If an illegal connection is found, corrections must be made before the Village will issue a Real Estate Transfer Tax Stamp, required at closing.

As a major incentive to have homes inspected, there will be no charge prior to September 30, 2007. After September 30, 2007, a \$50 inspection fee will be required. If a voluntary inspection of your plumbing system is made before September 30, 2007, and an illegal sump pump-sanitary sewer connection is found, the Village will share in the cost of repairs up to \$2,500.

July 20, 9 - 9:45 p.m.



Minimize Mosquito Breeding Sites

Residents are reminded to eliminate all standing water on their property which can be a breeding ground for mosquitoes. One of the dangers posed by mosquitoes is the possibility of contracting West Nile Virus. Last year a death occurred in Glen Ellyn due to West Nile Virus. Appropriate measures should always be taken to use insect repellent and remove any containers of water that could serve as a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

Eliminate Breeding Places

Every 7-10 days, new mosquitoes can be produced in stagnant water. To eliminate this problem:

- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles or any container holding water
- Fill in or drain any low places (puddles, ruts) in yard
- Keep gutters, drains, ditches and culverts free of weeds and trash, so water drains properly
- Cover trash containers to keep out rain water
- Repair leaky pipes and outdoor faucets
- Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week and store indoors when not in use
- Make sure your backyard pool is cared for while on vacation
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or concrete
- Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least weekly
- Keep grass cut short and shrubbery well trimmed around the house so adult mosquitoes can't hide there

The Glen Ellyn Mosquito Abatement District patrols public lands to control mosquitoes. The Mosquito Abatement District is separate from Village government, and can be reached at 469-4085. Construction Update

The Lambert Farms Utility Improvements Project is nearly complete. Lambert Road and the subdivision roadways have been re-paved. Ongoing work currently includes shoulder installation, placement of sod, completion of all sidewalk construction and miscellaneous restorations around the project corridor. Scheduled completion: July 2007.

The Duane Street Improvements Project will be underway by the end of June. The project features the complete reconstruction of the Duane Street corridor (in asphalt) between Forest and Carleton, including Duane Terrace. Scheduled completion: November 2007.

Construction work on the **East Panfish Basin Improvements Project** is planned to begin in July. Improvements include a new water main and storm sewer, and the resurfacing of Nicoll Way, Pershing and Wilson south of Roosevelt Road and west of Route 53. Work should take approximately two months to complete.

Reconstruction and resurfacing of about **2.5 miles of Village roadways** will take place in three areas under the 2007 Street Improvements Project. Slated for reconstruction are Exmoor and DuPage west of Newton Park; Lakeview Terrace; and Crest between High and Lakeview. Resurfacing sections include Fairview and the six cul-de-sac streets north of Fairview between Park and Bryant; Forest from Lakeview to Hill; Main Street south of Roosevelt Road; and Wilson and Harding. Construction work will begin in July. Scheduled completion: end of November 2007.



Oak Wilt Disease Threatens Area Trees

Oak Wilt has been detected on Crescent Boulevard in Glen Ellyn. This is a serious disease that can kill many species of oak trees. Oak Wilt is caused by a fungus that invades the water-conducting system of a tree and interferes with the normal water flow. In most cases, oak trees that contract Oak Wilt die within a short period of time. Red, pin and black oak are most affected, with white, bur and swamp oak being less susceptible to the disease.

Spread of Oak Wilt

Oak Wilt moves from tree to tree in two ways: 90% of the spread occurs by root graft, with infected tree roots intertwining with a healthy tree. The other 10% of the spread occurs when beetles carry the fungus and bore into a healthy tree.

Symptoms

Symptoms usually progress from the top of the tree downward. Generally the leaves at the top of the tree turn a dull green, then tan, then wilt and start falling. This typically occurs from late June to early July. As the disease progresses, individual leaves quickly discolor, taking on a bronzed appearance. The discoloration progresses around the margins of the leaf from the tip to the base. Leaves fall rapidly as the disease progresses. Trees can defoliate within a few weeks from the onset of symptoms.

Diagnosis and Management

There are two ways to contain the disease: 1) provide a root graft barrier by trenching between the infected tree and healthy trees, and 2) remove the infected tree as soon as possible. For healthy trees, an arborist can inject a chemical that will help protect the tree from the disease.

As a precautionary measure, no pruning of oak trees should occur between April and October. The beetle that carries the fungus is attracted to freshly cut wood. Any firewood from an infected tree that is kept must have the bark peeled off.

Please watch for Oak Wilt symptoms in your neighborhood. If you think a public tree may have the symptoms, contact the Public Works Department at 469-6756. For trees on private property, contact a professional arborist immediately. If the tree tests positive for Oak Wilt disease, please contact the Public Works Department.

Update:

Glen Ellyn Clinic Construction

Construction of the new Glen Ellyn Clinic facility, located on Pennsylvania Ave., is well underway. The



Glen Ellyn Clinic staff is expected to occupy the new 92,000-sq. ft. medical building in February 2008. The new facility will replace the current building and is designed to house the pediatrics, orthopedics and internal medicine departments, together with some of the most advanced medical and diagnostic equipment available.

During the upcoming weeks, contractors will be installing windows and completing utility connections for the three-story building. The facility's roof and mechanical systems will also be added this summer.

Completion of the new building will be the end of phase 2 of the project. Phase 3 and 4 will take place after February 2008 and will involve demolition of the former building and the addition and reconfiguration of parking lots.

The clinic has been part of the Village since 1963 and is the largest employer in the Central Business District with 360 full- and part-time employees. The Clinic treats approximately 600 patients per day.


Building Permits Required for Many Projects

Building and excavation permits — designed to protect your family and property — are required for a wide variety of building projects, including, but not limited to:

- Fences
- Driveway approaches
- Decks
- Accessory structures such as gazebos, greenhouses, sheds, trash enclosures, fire pits and in-ground swimming pools
- Interior remodeling
- Heating and air-conditioning equipment
- Sewer and water service repair
- Electrical and plumbing work
- Lawn sprinkler systems

- Fire sprinkler systems
- Installation or replacement of air-conditioners, water heaters, furnaces, boilers, radiant heaters or gas space heaters
- Installation or replacement of windows or doors
- The addition of handrails, guardrails, stairs and ramps

This is only a partial list of projects, so please contact the Planning and Development Department at 547-5250, 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., Monday - Friday, before beginning any new project. A staff member is available to answer your building and zoning questions.



The Village of Glen Ellyn is fortunate to have a wide range of talented individuals serving on its advisory boards and commissions. Lee Marks is one of those individuals, having served more than 10 years as a member of the Historic

Preservation Commission and today as its Chairman.

Lee's initial interest in the history of Glen Ellyn was sparked by events which occurred soon after he and his wife, Judy, moved to town in 1965. These included the Village of Glen Ellyn's purchase of Stacy's Tavern, a former stagecoach inn, to serve as a historical museum for the community. At the same time, Glen Ellyn's Historical Society was being formed and the Marks' became charter members.

"We worked with Glen Ellyn architect Jerry Perkins on the restoration of Stacy's Tavern," Lee said, "and the knowledge and expertise I gained from that work was something I wanted to bring back to the Village as a member of the Historic Preservation Commission."

Stacy's Tavern, according to Lee, is the state's only remaining stagecoach stop that has been restored and still remains on its original site. "The state's Historic Preservation Agency called it one of the best restorations in the state as far as authenticity and historic quality of the work," Marks said.

"Once the Stacy's Tavern restoration began in the late 1960s, we started talking about a History Park in the area — in the manner of Naper Settlement [a historic collection of structures in Naperville]," Lee said. "And lo and behold, it's now coming to pass and it's going to be wonderful for the Village — a great tourist attraction that will enhance our educational resources as well. We want kids to come to the History Park

and be able to experience what life was like back in the 1840s. The new attraction will help to bolster our business district as well."

One of the Village's current projects with which the Historic Preservation Commission is involved is a survey of Glen Ellyn's historic homes and neighborhoods. This is required by the state to maintain the Village's status as a certified local government with a comprehensive historical preservation program. The Village has hired a firm to document homes with historic or architectural significance.

"They'll try to find out when it was built, who the architect was and if they were famous and also whether the home contributes to the historic character of Glen Ellyn and would possibly be a candidate for landmark status or the National Register of Historic Places.

Many of the homeowners have become very excited about the survey," Lee continued, "and have sent notes to the Village along with any background they might have on the home. It helps to create additional pride in ownership."

Lee believes that all members of the Glen Ellyn community can help to retain the historic character of the town. "With regard to the teardown situation," Lee said, "we're hoping that builders will construct homes that are in character with that particular historic area."

A retired advertising and marketing professional, Lee continues to invest his time and energy into the community. "From the first moment I saw Glen Ellyn, I wanted to move here," Lee said. "Glen Ellyn reminds me of many small, charming New England towns and we hope to be able to keep it that way."

- 335 Cottage Avenue



If you do not call prior to noon, Allied Waste will not return until the following week.
- ▶ Residents are reminded that Village ordinance requires that you **clean up after your dog** on public property, sidewalks and parkways. Dogs must also be on a leash when not on their own property and should never be permitted to run off of private property when pedestrians walk by. Also, frequent barking is a violation of Village ordinance.
- ▶ If you experience a **power outage**, please contact ComEd at 800-334-7661.
- ▶ Residents are reminded that the **curfew for children under 17 years** of age is

- ▶ As the growing season continues, please **keep grass and weeds cut** to less than 8". Also, residents are asked to trim tree limbs and shrubs that overhang sidewalks or parkways so they do not pose safety hazards.
- ▶ **Summer watering restrictions are now in effect.** Homes with even-numbered addresses may only water on even-numbered dates and homes with odd-numbered addresses may only water on odd-numbered dates.
- ▶ **New vehicle stickers should have been purchased by April 30, 2007.** If you have not purchased your vehicle stickers, late fees apply and you may be ticketed. Remember, when you sell your house, the Village will collect all late fees and fines, including those for past vehicle stickers not purchased.
