State of the Village: 2006 Marked by Change

In her State of the Village address, given at the February 12 Village Board Meeting, Village President Vicky Hase said that the year 2006 was marked by change.

In July of 2006, Robin Weaver took over as Village Manager for Gary

Webster who retired after 21 years, Hase said. Weaver had been Roselle's Village Administrator for 15 years. Other notable changes for 2006 included:

- The formation of the Downtown Business Alliance, with a goal of publicizing the downtown as a destination for shoppers and to organize new events.
- The institution of new parking regulations in the Central Business District (CBD), providing alternative parking for CBD employees to free up more convenient shopper parking on the street.

- Zoning Code modifications to assist retailers in marketing their businesses.
- Changes to the Holiday Walk celebration resulting in record attendance.
- Completion of the planned streetscape improvements and reconstruction of the Five Corners intersection to enhance this northern gateway to the community and to speed traffic flow.

Although the Village has experienced business vacancies as part of the economic cycle, Hase said that the Economic Development Corp. is continuing its efforts to recruit new businesses and several new leases are currently in negotiation. She reminded residents to support the Glen Ellyn business community to reduce the reliance on property taxes to fund essential services.

Milestone Anniversaries

This year will see the celebration of many milestone anniversaries, according to Hase. The Glen Ellyn Volunteer Fire

Company was established in 1907 and today has 63 volunteer members. Because of their generous volunteer spirit, the Volunteer Fire Company was chosen as the theme for the Village's 2007 Calendar. Hase encouraged the members of the community to donate to the Volunteer Fire Company.

The Glen Ellyn Public Library, chartered in 1907, is also celebrating its centennial anniversary. A newly published book details the library's history, while many events at the library this year will mark the anniversary.

Commercial Development

Approximately \$79 million in building construction occurred in Glen Ellyn in 2006. These developments represent a significant investment in the community and attest to the viability of the Village, Hase said.

Glen Ellyn is one of only a few municipalities in Illinois to have a predominantly volunteer Fire Company. And in 2007, the Glen Ellyn Volunteer Fire Company is celebrating its 100th year of service to the community. Donations support the training and equipment needs of these 63 individuals.

The level of service that these active volunteers give to our community would normally cost taxpayers over \$400 per household in property taxes each year. In lieu of property taxes, Glen Ellyn residents and businesses are asked to contribute to the annual fundraising campaign.

The Fire Company depends on this campaign for most of its operating revenue and is asking for contributions of \$100 per household and \$150 per business. Or, you may have seen the eye-catching, blue Volunteer Fire Company

plaques affixed to homes and businesses throughout town. These are known as Fire Marks and commemorate a historic tradition of "plaquing" homes where the resident had paid for fire insurance. Fire Marks are available for a donation of \$160 or more per household or \$210 or more per business. Make this, the Fire Company's 100th anniversary, the year you proudly add this colorful plaque to the front of your home or business.

This is the only fundraising program of the Glen Ellyn Volunteer Fire Company and residents and businesses are encouraged to make a donation to help ensure the future viability of this volunteer organization. This fund drive occurs once a year

and is conducted only by mail. Telephone solicitations by any other organization are not part of this effort and not endorsed by the Village. commercial development was approved in 2006 with construction underway.

- At the southwest corner of Nicoll and Roosevelt Road, the "Crossings of Glen Ellyn" commercial development also broke ground in 2006 and today some businesses have already opened there.
- The DuPage Medical Group was approved for construction of a new 92,000 sq. ft., \$23.5 million medical building on the current Glen Ellyn Clinic site on Pennsylvania Ave.

Infrastructure Improvements

Hase also pointed out that many significant improvements to the community's infrastructure took place in 2006.

Approximately \$7.3 million was spent on various roadway projects, including Prospect Ave., Sunset Ave., Glen Ellyn Manor and the Five Corners area. These projects included extensive watermain, sanitary sewer and storm sewer upgrades, as well as street rehabilitation. This program, approved by voters in the 2000 referendum, focused on drainage improvements and street rehabilitation.

Village beautification projects included the undergrounding of utility wires at the Five

Corners area and along Pennsylvania Ave. between Prospect and Glenwood. Construction of these projects was partially funded through an anonymous donation given to the Village in 2001 for this purpose.

Residential Development

Residential development activity continues, but at a slower pace than in previous years, according to Hase. Requests for building permits for additions or alterations were also down.

Upcoming Projects

Planning for new projects in Glen Ellyn will begin on several fronts in 2007:

- The review of the College of DuPage Master Plan, with anticipated work to include demolition of temporary facilities, construction of several new buildings and reconstruction of parking lots and the college's internal roadways.
- The completion of the 17 major Storm Sewer Improvement projects funded by bonds approved in the November 2000 referendum. Estimated total cost of these improvements, which spanned six years, is \$22 million.
- Roadway projects for 2007 will include the Hawthorne/Park Improvements

Project and complete reconstruction of Duane Street between Forest and Taylor Ave.

Clean Sweep Day

The 2006 Clean Sweep Day enabled residents to dispose of an unlimited amount of refuse at no extra charge and resulted in the disposal of 795 tons of trash. At the 2006 Household Hazardous Waste Collection, residents disposed of approximately 445 fifty-five gallon drums of material. At the same time, the Glen Ellyn Environmental Commission conducted a successful recycling extravaganza.

Glen Ellyn Officer Honored

The Glen Ellyn Police Department continues its tradition of providing excellent service to the residents of Glen Ellyn. A Glen Ellyn officer was recognized with the "Valor Award" for heroism from the *DuPage County One Hundred Club* for rescuing a one-year-old boy from a man who was trying to drown him. The same officer was recognized by the Village for pulling a man from a burning vehicle.

Conservative Fiscal Responsibility

Conservative fiscal responsibility has allowed the Village to weather difficult economic times, while maintaining service levels, Hase continued. The Village reduced full-time staff by two employee positions this past year. Since 1992, about 16 percent of the full-time staff has been eliminated.

In 2006 the Village Board abated or canceled property taxes for the 19th consecutive year by \$500,000 or more, reflecting a pledge made by the 1987 Village Board to pay off \$10 million of capital improvement bonds using other available funds instead of property taxes. With moderate gains in revenue and controls on expenditure, the Village Board was also able to cancel an additional \$200,000 of property taxes earmarked for daily Village operations. This was the second consecutive year in which property owners received a small reduction in their Village property tax bill.

In concluding, Hase said that the state of the Village of Glen Ellyn is strong and that the Village Board of Trustees will maintain its commitment to provide essential public services in a fiscally prudent manner. ■


Snowfall Reminders

It's everybody's job to pitch in and help keep Glen Ellyn safe during the winter. Residents are reminded that the Village does not plow or salt streets or roads maintained by other agencies—the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) or DuPage County—even if the roads are within the Village limits. Roosevelt Road and Route 53 are cleared by IDOT, while DuPage County's Department of Transportation is responsible for Geneva Rd., St. Charles Rd. and Park Blvd. south of Roosevelt Rd. In the winter months, residents should keep in mind some important reminders:

- ❖ Wherever possible, please clear sidewalks for pedestrians.
- ❖ Remove snow from around fire hydrants, so that they are visible in an emergency.
- ❖ Shoveling snow into the street is prohibited. It creates an unsafe condition for drivers.
- ❖ When there is a significant snowfall, clear any catch basin drains to help drainage in the event that there is a quick thaw.
- ❖ Remember, too, that the only feasible method of snow plowing streets is using side-delivery snowplows — which, unfortunately, may cause an accumulation of snow at the end of driveways.

While all side streets are plowed, minimal salting is done on side streets to reduce the environmental impact. All intersections, however, are salted. Residents are also reminded that there is no parking on Village streets after a 2" snowfall until the streets have been cleared.

Resident Cards

Village of Glen Ellyn residents can purchase 2007 Village Links Resident Cards at a pre-season discount through March 15. The pre-season annual Resident Card fee is \$5 (\$4 for juniors age 18 and younger). After March 15, the regular fee of \$15 (\$8 for juniors) will be in effect. With a Resident Card, you can obtain green fee discounts at the Village Links Golf Course. Only individuals residing within the corporate limits of Glen Ellyn are eligible to purchase Resident Cards.



Junior Golf Lessons

Registration is now open for the 2007 Village Links Junior Lessons Program at the Village Links Clubhouse. The Village Links golf professional staff conducts more than 30 summer coed lesson series for beginning and advanced junior golfers, age 8 and older. The \$30 beginner registration fee includes four, one-hour, instructional sessions, unlimited range balls during each lesson, a free 9-hole round of golf for every two lessons attended and a t-shirt and hat. The \$40 advanced student registration includes six, one-hour instruction sessions.

Enhanced Downtown Shopper Parking Now Available



As a result of discussions with downtown merchants and the Economic Development Corporation, the Village Board recently adopted improvements to downtown parking. These changes should help customers park and shop more easily.

changes are:

- On-street parking spaces are now available to customers only.
- The on-street parking time limit has been extended to three hours in most areas.
- The parking spaces in the parking lot behind the Fire Station (Main/Pennsylvania) have been converted to permit parking available only to CBD (Central Business District) employees at a discounted rate of \$160 annually. These permits are available at the Civic Center.

Many individuals and groups participated in developing these changes in order to increase the positive experience of shopping in Glen Ellyn.



Village Recognized for Financial Reporting Excellence

The Village of Glen Ellyn recently received an Excellence in Financial Reporting Award from the Government Finance Officers Association. This award recognizes the Village's commitment to maintaining high standards of excellence in the preparation of its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the fiscal year ending April 30, 2006. The Village has received this national recognition each year since 1988, a distinction earned by only 10 percent of local governments in the State of Illinois. Glen Ellyn Clinic Invests \$23.5 Million in the Downtown

The Glen Ellyn Clinic has broken ground for its new 92,000 sq. ft. medical building on Pennsylvania Ave. in downtown Glen Ellyn. The new facility will replace the current building and is designed to house pediatrics, orthopedics and internal medicine departments, together with some of the most advanced medical and diagnostic equipment available. It will also feature more comfortable exam and waiting rooms and an updated, contemporary design. The total cost for the project, with an expected completion date of June 2008, is \$23.5 million. The clinic has been part of the Village since 1963 and is the largest employer in the Central Business District with 360 full- and part-time employees. The Clinic treats approximately 600 patients per day.

Be on the Lookout for the Emerald Ash Borer in Your Firewood



The Emerald Ash Borer is a beetle that has killed nearly six million ash trees in Michigan and has now been discovered in Illinois. Ash trees make up nearly 12 percent of Glen Ellyn's tree population, second only to Maples. This beetle is extremely difficult to eradicate and once it bores into a tree, it is always fatal to the tree.

To curb the spread of this pest, the federal government has instituted a statewide quarantine restricting the movement of any ash product and all hardwood firewood across Illinois borders, unless the material has been treated to remove the threat of infestation.

If you already have firewood on your property which originated in Michigan in the last five years, notify the Glen Ellyn Public Works Department at 469-6756 to conduct an inspection. One piece of firewood can contain many larvae. Adults emerge mid-May until late July and leave a D-shaped exit hole in bark. Also, residents are asked not to plant any type of ash trees, because of their vulnerability to this pest. For more information, please call Public Works at 469-6756.

Glen Ellyn Public Library Celebrates 100th Anniversary with New Book

To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Glen Ellyn Public Library, a new book has been published. *Glen Ellyn Public Library: The First Century 1907-2007*, authored by Lynda Couch Hoornbeek and Judy Webster, was published late last fall and incorporates stories,

anecdotes and Glen Ellyn history, together with drawings, photos and historic articles and letters relating to the library.

New Law Makes Carbon Monoxide Alarms Mandatory

Effective January 1, 2007, every "dwelling unit" in Illinois will be required to have at least one approved carbon monoxide alarm in operating condition within 15 feet of each room used for sleeping purposes. The law, Public Act 094-0741, applies to single- and multiple-family residences, as well as mixed-use buildings.

The alarms may be battery-powered, plug-in with battery back-up or wired into the AC power line with a secondary battery back-up. They may be combined with smoke detecting devices if the combined unit complies with specific standards and the alarm differentiates the hazard.

Landlords must ensure that the alarms are working properly when a lease begins and must provide written information to tenants regarding testing and maintenance. Tenants are responsible for testing and maintaining the alarm during the duration of the lease. Violations of this law constitute a Class B criminal misdemeanor. The full content of Public Act 094-0741 can be found under Public Acts on the Illinois General Assembly website, www.ilga.gov.

Although cases of carbon monoxide poisoning are relatively rare, a problem as small as a leak in a furnace vent or a chimney obstructed by a bird's nest can cause the odorless, colorless gas to build up in a home. This is particularly true during the winter months when homes are sealed up against the cold.

Residents are also reminded to install and maintain at least one smoke detector on every level of their home and inside or near all sleeping areas.

Carbon monoxide detectors can be purchased at local hardware stores.

Lake Ellyn Restoration Deemed a Success

In cooperation with the Glen Ellyn Park District, the Village awarded an \$800,000 construction contract in 2005 for improvements at Lake Ellyn — funded in part by an anonymous donation to the Village in 2001. The improvements included the installation of a low-flow bypass pipe beneath Lake Ellyn that diverts incoming water in the winter months from entering the lake proper. This bypass system was designed to reduce currents and eddies in the lake that inhibit the uniform freezing of the lake.

In addition, four solids separators were installed on pipes leading into the lake inlet structures to reduce the quantities of floating and suspended material that would otherwise enter Lake Ellyn, thus improving the water quality.

Following the recent cold snap, Park District officials found that for the first time in many years, there is a uniform coating of ice, an indication of project success. In past years, freezing of the lake did not occur in a uniform manner. In mid-February, there was reportedly in excess of 10 inches of solid ice on top of the lake.

Volunteer Spotlight: Bill Peterson

"I love Glen Ellyn for the simple fact that it is an oasis of calm in an otherwise chaotic world," said Bill Peterson, an avid volunteer whose activities, in his own words, "run the gamut."

Peterson chairs Glen Ellyn's Architectural Review Commission (ARC), an advisory group charged with reviewing new construction for commercial and multi-family structures within the Village. In his time on the commission, the ARC has endeavored to improve design guidelines for commercial, industrial and mixed use structures in Glen Ellyn. "We've tried to make better, and in some cases, tougher decisions regarding the quality of building projects presented by various petitioners," he said. "The result has been building projects that are more harmonious with the surrounding structures."

The Historical Society's fundraising campaign for a planned History Park in

the Five Corners area of Glen Ellyn is another important undertaking for Peterson. He has played an active role in fostering the Village's purchase of the properties at 810-816 N. Main, in order to connect the land occupied by Stacy's Tavern Museum with the nearby History Center parcel.

"We've also implemented a yearly strategic planning session to help keep the Glen Ellyn Historical Society on track with its mission and objectives, including increasing donations and revenue with a goal of raising \$3 million dollars for the History Park."

Peterson's interest in the history of the community was sparked by a ten-year restoration of his 1920's Tudor style home. "During our restoration work, we researched the home's history and were able to track down the former owners and their descendants, who provided us with a rich history of the house, as well as photos. To our surprise, the pictures

yielded some eerie similarities, ranging from having the same type of dog to the same type of furniture."

Peterson is also an active participant in the Glen Ellyn Chamber of Commerce and served on the committee which produced the Village's most recent update of the Comprehensive Plan, a document which maps out future development for the community.

An avid gardener, Peterson received The Most Beautiful Shade Garden Award several years ago in the Village's Annual Beautiful Garden Awards Contest. He is currently pursuing a degree in Ornamental Horticulture. "When I'm not volunteering, I can be found working in my garden tending to my collection of collector's plants," he said.

Peterson and his wife, Heidie Jevey, have been married for 15 years. "During the warmer months, Heidie and I enjoy sitting on the front stoop of our home with a glass of wine in hand," he said. "People driving by beep their horns and wave. Many times we can't see who they are, but we wave back and enjoy watching the world unfold before us. This is the best way to experience Glen Ellyn."

RAPID REMINDERS

- ▶ When using your Village-provided refuse cart, please remember that the lid must be closed. The Village waste hauler is not required to collect carts that are overstuffed or those that have bags or other items placed on top of them.
- ▶ Village ordinance prohibits residents from putting garbage out at the curb before 4:30 p.m. on the day before Monday's refuse collection. To ensure refuse is picked up, it must be at the curb by 7 a.m. on the collection day. Garbage cans must be removed from the curb within 24 hours after pickup. If your pickup is missed or you wish to arrange for a special pickup, contact the refuse hauler, Allied Waste (formerly BFI), at 469-1036. - ▶ Do you have any unpaid parking tickets? The Police Department is in the process of sending overdue, unpaid parking ticket fines to a collections company. If you have unpaid parking violations, you can pay by mail or in person at the Police Department, 24 hours a day. Late penalties apply. A court date may be requested for those who wish to contest outstanding violations. In this case, the violator must come to the Police Department to establish a date. If you're unsure whether you have any outstanding parking violation fines, either for past or currently owned vehicles, please call the Police Department at 469-1187, anytime, day or night.
- ▶ Parking is not permitted overnight on Village streets from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. If you do park on the street overnight, your car may be ticketed. Exceptions can be made for special circumstances by contacting the Police Department at 469-1187.
