## Village Moves Forward with

### Downtown Study

One of Glen Ellyn's greatest assets is the charm of its central business district. In order to identify new opportunities and focus on the wishes and desires of residents and business owners alike, the Village recently selected a firm to head up a study of the central business district and to make recommendations in a variety of areas. The selected firm, Town Builder Studios, of Riverside, IL, was chosen from 17 firms that submitted proposals to conduct the study. It is anticipated that the study will take approximately nine to twelve months to complete and will include an evaluation of:

- Parking issues/needs
- Existing businesses and structures
- Infrastructure and streetscape, including streets, sidewalks, street furniture, plantings, signage and overhead utilities
- Transportation improvement opportunities
- Potential areas for redevelopment/investment
- Zoning boundaries and changes
- Coordination of downtown efforts
- Historic assets
- Market study/promotion strategies

## State of the Village: 2007 Distinguished by Milestone Anniversaries, New Developments

On January 28, Village President Vicky Hase presented the annual State of the Village address at the regular Village Board Meeting. Hase said that 2007 was a year for celebration,

with the community marking two major anniversaries: 100 years of service for both the Glen Ellyn Volunteer Fire Company and the Glen Ellyn Public Library.

The library marked this milestone with special programs throughout the year, as well as a new book highlighting the history of the library. The Glen Ellyn Volunteer Fire Company ended its anniversary year with the dedication of a bronze statue of a fireman at the downtown fire station. This was made possible, Hase said, through the generosity of a Glen Ellyn resident who recognizes the value that the Volunteer Fire Company gives to the residents of Glen Ellyn — one of only a few municipalities in the Chicago area to have a predominantly volunteer fire company. Hase pointed out that the Village's volunteer firemen represent the ultimate in Glen Ellyn's volunteer spirit.

In 2007, Hase continued, the Central Business District held a highly successful Jazz Fest for the first time and added a new holiday tree, together with a holiday tree and decorations at Stacy's Corners (the intersection of Main and Geneva).

Development of a planned History Park at Stacy's Corners, designed to showcase Glen Ellyn's rich heritage, took another step forward with the purchase of the property on the southwest corner.

### Award for Financial Management

The Village's sound financial management and economic strength were recognized again this year by the Government Finance Officers Association, which gave the Village its Award for Excellence in Financial Reporting. The Village has received this recognition each year since 1988, a distinction that is achieved by fewer than 10 percent of local governments in Illinois.

In addition, Hase said, the Village maintains a strong Aa2 bond rating, which permits financing of capital improvements at lower interest costs.

In February 2007, the Village Board abated or reduced property taxes for the 20th consecutive year by \$500,000 or more, and since 1987, has eliminated approximately \$10.3 million in property taxes. This began with a pledge made by the 1987 Village Board to pay off \$10 million of capital improvement bonds using revenues other than property taxes.

### New Development

Commercial and residential development continued at a healthy pace in 2007 with approximately \$80 million of building construction occurring — similar to 2006 figures. Notable commercial projects completed in 2007 included:

- Potbelly Sandwich Works
- Glen Ellyn Plaza Shopping Center (across from McDonald's)
- NAPA Auto Parts across from the Baker Hill Shopping Center

*Other projects begun in 2007 and slated for completion in 2008 include:*

- The Aldi grocery store in the Glen Ellyn Crossing Shopping Center

- A new, \$23.5 million Glen Ellyn Clinic in the downtown
- An upgrade of the Holiday Inn on Roosevelt Rd. east of I-355 into a Crowne Plaza Hotel

The Village Board also approved the \$280 million COD Master Facilities Plan in 2007. Most notably, this project will see the demolition of several longstanding "temporary" buildings and the construction of several new buildings, together with the reconfiguration and reconstruction of COD's parking lots and internal roadway system.

Several new residential projects were in the design and construction phases last year, according to Hase:

- Water's Edge was completed and Kingsbrook Glen is now under construction (both are located south of Roosevelt Rd. in the Panfish Park area)
- Georgetown by the River, on Swift Road, was approved and construction started in 2007
- The Courtyards of Glen Ellyn, a 24-unit townhouse development, at the corner of Kenilworth Avenue and Pennsylvania Avenue, began in 2007

Last year, Hase said, the Planning and Development Department reported:

- 32 demolition permit applications (down from 38 in 2006 and 60 in 2005), a total representing less than one-half of 1% of the Village's single-family housing stock per year
- 30 building permits for new single-family homes (down from 46 in 2006 and 62 in 2005)
- 165 permits for additions and alterations to single-family homes (compared to 156 in 2006)

The Village Board entered into an intergovernmental agreement with the Glen Ellyn Park District for the construction of a regional stormwater facility in Ackerman Park. This project will free up the detention basin on the Stacy's Corners Walgreens site for additional commercial development.

### Roadway/Drainage Improvements

In the November 2000 general election, Glen Ellyn voters approved the purchase

of bonds to fund roadway rehabilitation and 17 major storm sewer improvement projects. To-date, sixteen drainage projects have been completed, while the final project — the Kenilworth Basin Storm Sewer Project — is in final design and expected to be completed in early 2008.

The Village expended a total of \$11 million last year on infrastructure projects, including resurfacing of nearly 4.5 miles of streets and reconstruction of slightly less than 1 mile — out of a total of 83 miles of streets.

Capital projects slated for this year, at a total cost of \$12.8 million, include:

- 2.7 miles of street rehabilitation
- 1.6 miles of street reconstruction
- 1 mile of new and replacement storm sewer
- 4.8 miles of new and rehabilitated sanitary sewer
- 2.4 miles of new extensions and replacement water mains

The Village was fortunate to receive a Community Development Block Grant from DuPage County, Hase said — the largest of its kind ever awarded by the county — for sanitary/sewer improvements in the Braeside area of Glen Ellyn. (See page 6 for more information about these improvements.)

### Beautification of Entryways

Another important initiative is the beautification of the entrances to the Village, made possible in part by a \$2 million anonymous donation to the Village in 2000, the final portion of which was spent in 2007. To improve aesthetics, undergrounding of overhead utility wires took place:

- On Crescent Boulevard adjacent to Glenbard West
- At Stacy's Corners
- And is now underway along the Pennsylvania Avenue corridor between Prospect and Glenwood

An additional use for the anonymous donation, Hase said, was to improve water conditions in Lake Ellyn. To do this, the Village worked with the Glen Ellyn Park District to make several modifications, including:

- Installation of vortex separators on the lake's stormwater outlets to catch particles and debris

- Placement of a low-flow bypass pipe on the bottom of the lake to carry water runoff with high salt content past the lake during the winter

Hase expressed her gratitude to the resident who made the donation and said that the Village is preparing a resolution of thanks documenting the use of the donated funds in Village beautification.

### Police Department Programs

In 2007, the Glen Ellyn Police Department added two new police officer positions and instituted several new community education programs, including Identity Theft Seminars, a Senior Citizens Police Academy, a Bank Safety Seminar for bank employees in the Village, the Emergency Identification Bracelet Program, and the Faces 4 Participation Program to educate drivers about the hazards of speeding. The Police Department is also involved in the DuPage County On-Site Assistance Program, which was initiated to help municipalities design and conduct large-scale emergency training exercises, now required by the state and federal government.

### A Village Links First


For the first time in its history, the Village Links Golf Course hosted a U.S. Women's Open Qualifying in 2007, attracting golfers from around the world. In addition, 2007 was a strong revenue year at the Links. The Village Links operates solely on the revenues generated from users, without any tax money.

### Looking Ahead

The Glen Ellyn Village Board looked ahead to future long- and short-term objectives at a Village Board Retreat in November 2007. Notable goals for the coming years include:

- Long-term funding strategies for infrastructure/roadway improvements
- Funding options for increasing pension and health costs
- A downtown development study
- Contingencies for supporting fire service in the Village
- Development of the Village's local disaster and preparedness plan
- Planning for best use of technology in all departments
- Continuing to work to streamline Village Government operations

In closing, Hase said that the state of the Village is strong as the community continues to celebrate our heritage, while actively planning for the future.

### Pre-Season Golf Registration

#### Permanent Times

Golfers can sign up for the 2008 weekend permanent starting time drawing at the Village Links Golf Course through 5 p.m., Sunday, March 2. Foursomes signed up by March 2 will draw for starting times on Wednesday, March 5, at 7:30 p.m., at the Civic Center.

#### Resident Cards

Village of Glen Ellyn residents can purchase 2008 Village Links Resident Cards at a pre-season discount through March 15. The pre-season annual Resident Card fee is \$5 (\$4 for juniors age 18 and younger). After March 15, the regular fee of \$15 (\$8 for juniors) will be in effect. Resident Cards provide green fee discounts at the Village Links Golf Course. Only persons who reside within the corporate limits of the Village of Glen Ellyn are eligible to purchase Resident Cards.



#### Junior Golf Lessons

Registration for the 2008 Village Links Junior Golf Lesson Program began Saturday, February 2. The Village Links golf professional staff conducts 15 summer coed lesson series for beginning and advanced junior golfers, age 8 and older. The \$30 beginner registration fee includes four one-hour instructional sessions with unlimited range balls during each lesson.



#### New for 2008: One

Day Junior Golf Camps. Each camp will include a visit to three instruction stations that will cover all phases of the game of golf, followed by lunch and 9 holes of golf. Each camp will begin at 9 a.m. and end at 3 p.m. One Village Links Golf Professional will provide personalized instruction and remain with the students through lunch and their 9 holes on the course. The cost is \$50 per camp. Camps are scheduled on 17 days throughout the summer, giving juniors the flexibility to sign up for as many camps as they like.

## Volunteer Profile: Student Members of Commissions

In recent years, the Village of Glen Ellyn has invited area students to apply for positions on its advisory commissions. Students typically serve until they graduate from high school. The following student commissioners are currently serving.



Hannah Loftus is a member of the Architectural Review Commission (ARC), which reviews and makes recommendations concerning exterior

design, signs, landscaping, site plans and materials for proposed new construction and remodeling of commercial and multi-family buildings.

“Though admittedly I’m rather inexperienced when it comes to the technical details of architecture,” Loftus said, “I’ve learned a great deal since becoming a commissioner. It’s really taught me to consider all aspects of buildings, not just the general facade.”

“I enjoy having a voice in the community, Loftus continued, “even as a student.”

Loftus, who first learned of the opportunity through her dad, Tim Loftus, currently serving on the Historic Preservation Commission, is enthusiastic about encouraging other students to apply.

“It really is a great opportunity for those interested in making a difference in Glen Ellyn — and somewhat minimal for those with heavy amounts of homework. You don’t have to be intimidated or afraid to speak your mind; your input can always help.”

A junior at Glenbard West, Loftus also tutors at the Glen Ellyn Resource Center in a program targeted to refugees and underprivileged individuals in the community. In addition, she is a member of Glenbard West’s Key Club — the largest high school service organization in the world promoting community service, leadership development and fellowship.

“I really enjoy learning anything and everything I can,” Loftus said, “and being a member of a commission helps me to do that.”

“Our commission provides support and guidance in ways to preserve Glen Ellyn’s historic character,” said Elizabeth Buckton,

who serves on the Historic Preservation Commission. “We are about to begin reviewing nominations for the annual Historic Preservation Awards program,” she continued, “and it’s one of my favorite things to work on with the commission.”

Buckton, who is a junior at Glenbard West, finds great satisfaction in other aspects of the experience as well. “I enjoy the public speaking experience,” she said, “and knowing that the other members care about my ideas, even if I’m only 17.”

Buckton plans to focus on business and finance in college. “Many of the things I do on the commission will be of help in college,” she said, “reading reports, attending meetings, making recommendations and reviewing budgets, will all be valuable experiences for my future studies.”

In addition to her duties with the commission, Buckton is a member of Glenbard West’s Forensics Team and Model UN.

Her advice to other students considering applying for a commission: “Just do it. It’s only one night a month and it’s a wonderful chance to give back to our community which has given us so many opportunities.”

## Glen Ellyn Volunteer Fire Company Fund Drive Underway: Will You Help?

Glen Ellyn is one of only a few municipalities in Illinois to have a predominantly volunteer fire company. And in 2007, the Glen Ellyn Volunteer Fire Company celebrated its 100th year of service to the community. Will you show your support for the people who continue to stand ready to assist residents 24 hours a day, seven days a week? Donations support the training and equipment needs of the approximately 60 volunteer firefighters.

The level of service that these active volunteers give to our community would normally cost taxpayers over \$400 per household in property taxes each year. In lieu of property taxes, Glen Ellyn residents and businesses are asked to contribute to the annual fundraising campaign.

The Volunteer Fire Company depends on this campaign for most of its operating revenue and is asking for contributions of \$100 per household and \$150 per business. Or, you may have seen the eye-catching, blue

Volunteer Fire Company plaques affixed to homes and businesses throughout town. These are known as fire marks and commemorate a past tradition of "plaquing" homes where the resident had paid for fire insurance. Fire marks are available for a donation of \$160 or more per household or \$210 or more per business. Make this the year you proudly add this colorful plaque to the front of your home or business.

This is the only fundraising program of the Glen Ellyn Volunteer Fire Company and residents and businesses are encouraged to make a donation to help ensure the future viability of this volunteer organization. This fund drive occurs once a year and is conducted only by mail. Telephone solicitations by any other organization are not part of this effort and are not endorsed by the

## Snowfall Reminders

By following certain procedures, we can all keep Glen Ellyn safe during the winter. Residents are reminded that the Village does not plow or salt streets or roads maintained by other agencies—the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) or DuPage County—even if the roads are within the Village limits. Roosevelt Road and Route 53 are cleared by IDOT, while DuPage County's Department of Transportation is responsible for Geneva Rd., St. Charles Rd. and Park Blvd. south of Raintree Dr./Buena Vista. In the winter months, residents should keep in mind some important reminders:

- Wherever possible, please clear sidewalks for pedestrians.
- Remove snow from around fire hydrants, so that they are visible in an emergency.
- Shoveling snow into the street is prohibited, since it creates an unsafe condition for drivers.



- When there is a significant snowfall, clear any catch basin drains to help drainage in the event that there is a quick thaw.
- Remember, too, that the only feasible method of snowplowing streets is using side-delivery snowplows — which, unfortunately, may cause an accumulation of snow at the end of driveways.

While all side streets are plowed, minimal salting is done on side streets to reduce the environmental impact. All intersections, however, are salted. Residents are also reminded that there is no parking on Village streets after a 2" snowfall until the streets have been cleared.

## Clean Sweep Monday, April 28



## 2007 Historic Preservation Commission Award Nominations



The historic character of our neighborhoods is an important feature of Glen Ellyn. To recognize restorations and new construction

that contribute to the preservation of our historic streetscapes, the Village's Historic Preservation Commission annually recognizes outstanding projects. The deadline for submissions is April 30, 2008, for projects completed during the 2007 calendar year.

### Restoration of the Year Award

The Restoration of the Year Award recognizes an outstanding effort to restore the exterior of a home, outbuilding or commercial structure in a manner contributing to the preservation of Glen Ellyn history. Entries are judged on how the exterior restoration is in keeping with the home's historic character.

### Streetscape Compatibility Award

The Streetscape Compatibility Award recognizes outstanding new homes and commercial structures in an architectural style and scale that contribute to the preservation of Glen Ellyn's historic streetscapes. Entries are judged on their compatibility with the existing streetscape.

### Architectural Details Award

The Architectural Details Award is presented for an outstanding effort to restore an exterior detail element of a home or building in a manner fitting its historic character. Examples include porches, cornice work, leaded glass windows or decorative fencing.

## Village Receives Block Grant for Braeside Area

The Village of Glen Ellyn has received a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) of up to \$710,000 for neighborhood improvements. In 2008, the grant will be used for work in the Braeside subdivision located east of I-355 and north of Roosevelt Road.

The federal grant, which was awarded through the DuPage County Community Development Commission, will fund improvements that include: the rehabilitation of sanitary sewers and manholes throughout the entire subdivision, replacement of deteriorated water mains, roadway reconstruction on Surrey Drive and storm sewer upgrades to improve street drainage. The estimated cost of these improvements is \$2 million.

## Profile: Glen Ellyn Businesses Offering Fair Trade Products

**F**air trade is an organized movement promoting fair wages, improved environmental standards and proper working conditions in the production of a wide variety of goods purchased through international trade, primarily from disadvantaged countries — offering producers, artisans and farmers a better quality of life. Fair trade focuses in particular on products such as coffee, cocoa, sugar, tea, bananas, honey, cotton, wine, fresh fruit and handicrafts. The aim of fair trade is to enable producers to move from relative poverty to a position of economic self-sufficiency. According to an October 2006 study by the International Fair Trade Association, over 1.5 million disadvantaged producers worldwide were directly benefiting from fair trade, while an additional five million benefited from fair trade-funded infrastructure and community development projects. The following Glen Ellyn businesses offer fair trade products.

This store funds the work of the SARET Charitable Fund, which for decades has helped families and residents in DuPage County who have fallen on hard times. The organization gets its name and inspiration from a Cambodian child, afflicted with a liver condition, who was helped by the group's volunteers more than 20 years ago. Residents in Wheaton and Glen Ellyn assisted the family throughout Saret's illness; when Saret died after about a year, the volunteers founded a charity group in her name.

The SARET store opened in November 2007 and sells jewelry, some of which is created by clients helped by



the charity, as well as work from artists and artisans from India, Israel, Nepal, Peru, China and Thailand. Merchandise also includes health books on herbs, flower essences and homeopathy, organically certified body care products, organic teas and herbs, and handmade belts, bags and clothing.

During the first week of each month, 10 percent of any store purchase goes to the charity of the shopper's choice.

Trader Joe's describes itself as "your unique grocery store." The store offers many fair trade products, as well as items designed to be environmentally friendly. The Trader Joe's fare includes gourmet foods, organic foods, vegetarian foods, unusual frozen foods, imported foods, domestic and imported wine, "alternative" food items, and basics like bread, cereal, eggs, dairy, coffee and produce. Non-food items include personal hygiene products, household cleaners, vitamins, pet food, plants and flowers.

Fair trade products sold at Trader Joe's have the words "Fair Trade" printed visibly on the label.





## Rapid Reminders

- When using your Village-provided refuse cart, please remember that the lid must be closed. The Village waste hauler is not required to collect carts that are overstuffed or those that have bags or other items placed on top of them.
- Village ordinance prohibits residents from putting garbage out at the curb before 4:30 p.m. on the day before Monday's refuse collection. To ensure refuse is picked up, it must be at the curb by 7 a.m. on the collection day. Refuse carts must be removed from the curb within 24 hours after pickup. If your refuse was out by 7 a.m. and your pickup was missed, or you wish to arrange for a special pickup, contact the refuse hauler, Allied Waste, at 630-469-1036. - Parking is not permitted overnight on Village streets from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m.

If you do park on the street overnight, your car may be ticketed. Exceptions can be made for special circumstances by contacting the Police Department at 630-469-1187.

- During very cold weather, it is recommended that you run a trickle of water from any faucets where pipes are located in outside walls in order to prevent pipes from freezing. If your home has water supply piping in exterior walls, be sure to keep your home well heated and seal up any cold air leaks that you may find.
- Call J.U.L.I.E. before you dig on your property to make sure you don't damage buried utilities and incur the costs of repairing the damage. J.U.L.I.E. now has a new number: 811, which is answered 24 hours/day, seven days/week. Once you call, J.U.L.I.E. personnel will mark the approximate location of underground utilities at no cost.
