Downtown Planning Study to Move Forward with Public Input



The Village recently initiated a planning study to identify opportunities and areas for improvement and growth in the downtown. Long known as a “destination downtown” for people in the western suburbs, Glen Ellyn’s Central Business District has been experiencing a number of vacancies over the past several years — not an uncommon problem for downtowns in many municipalities which now must compete with malls, discount stores and online shopping, to name a few.

As a result, the Village recently hired Town Builder Studios of Riverside, IL, to provide an extensive analysis of the downtown and to make recommendations. Town Builder Studios was selected from 17 firms that submitted proposals to conduct the study.

The study will review:

- Parking issues/needs
- Existing structures and maintenance of buildings
- Infrastructure and streetscape, including streets, sidewalks, street furniture, plantings, signage and overhead utilities
- Transportation improvement opportunities
- Potential areas for redevelopment/investment
- Zoning boundaries and changes
- Coordination of downtown efforts
- Historic assets
- Market study/promotion strategies

Feedback from residents and business owners will be a key component of the

study and will be gathered in a variety of ways, including:

- Individual meetings with key business and organization leaders and groups
- Two town hall meetings open to all residents
- Two surveys: one for downtown merchants and another general public survey
- An interactive website for feedback linked through the Village's website: www.glenellyn.org.

In addition, the Village has set up a Downtown Advisory Committee (DAC) representing a variety of groups

with an interest in the downtown.

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The DAC will meet periodically throughout the duration of the study — expected to take nine to twelve months to complete. The committee will comment on the various elements of the report, offer opinions regarding the plan and make a recommendation to the Village Board concerning adoption of a final downtown plan. The final plan will guide the future development of the Central Business District.


Unlimited Trash Pickup

The unlimited trash pickup will take place on Monday, April 28. All materials must be containerized or bundled and placed at the curb by 7 a.m. You may put out the following items as part of your regular pickup at no additional charge:

- Regular refuse
- Furniture
- Fixtures
- Tires
- Recreational equipment
- Household appliances of all kinds
- Household construction and demolition debris (total refuse limited to 6 cubic yards or about eight 33-gallon cans)

Volunteer Profile: Jerry Perkins, a "Living Legend"

To acknowledge the contributions of notable Glen Ellyn residents, the Glen Ellyn Historical Society recently instituted a special program known as the "Glen Ellyn Living Legends Award." Local architect, Jerry Perkins, will be the first recipient of the award, and will be recognized at an open house on Sunday, April 20, at the Glen Ellyn Historical Society's History Center, 800 N. Main St.

The open house will feature an exhibit highlighting Perkins' innumerable accomplishments, together with a collection of his watercolors.

A lifelong resident of Glen Ellyn, Perkins' architectural design skills were brought to bear on countless high-profile local projects during a career that has spanned 50+ years.

His work includes the conversion of Duane Street School into the present day Glen Ellyn Civic Center, the design for the downtown Fire Station, an addition and remodeling of the former Village Hall and Police Station on Pennsylvania Ave., the restoration of Stacy's Tavern Museum in the 1970s and a host of other commercial and residential projects.

Perkins opened his first office in Glen Ellyn under the name of Gerald A. Perkins. When Charles Norris joined him two years later, the firm's name was changed to Perkins & Norris. After his partner, Charles Norris, passed away, the firm added new partners and today operates under the name PPKS.

A member of Glen Ellyn's Historical Society since its inception, Perkins recently developed a design for the planned History Park at Stacy's Corners.

"When we were working on the plan," Perkins said, "I woke up one night with the idea of replicating the Pagoda that once stood over the five springs in Glen Ellyn."

The five springs were an abundant source of water considered "medicinal" in their properties and bottled and sold throughout the country. The former site of the springs is denoted by a historical marker on Crescent Blvd. between Chidester and Oak Streets.

After graduating from Glenbard West High School, Perkins attended the University of Illinois at Champaign for architecture and went on to serve in World War II where he was a bomber pilot with the Eighth Air Force stationed in England. He flew a four-engine bomber known as a Liberator.

Following the war, he married his wife, Janice. "Janice contracted polio when she was 22," he said, "and was wheelchair-bound until she passed away in 2002."

Perkins designed a one-story home in Glen Ellyn for Janice's special needs where he still resides today. Jerry and Janice have four children, nine grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

In addition to his Glen Ellyn Historical Society volunteer activities, Perkins served as Village Trustee from 1952 to 1956 and as the Secretary/Treasurer of the Forest Hill Cemetery at Riford and St. Charles Roads, a position which involves managing all aspects of the property.

"A good part of Glen Ellyn's history is in Forest Hill," he said. "The very first pioneers are buried there, going back to 1832 when the daughter of the Churchill family died at a young age. She was initially buried by the family's cabin and when the cemetery land was

donated to the Village, her body was moved there."


Perkins was recently re-appointed to the Village's Historic Preservation Commission and continues to be enthusiastic about the community which he has been a member of for so long.

"I like the fact that Glen Ellyn is part city and part country," he said. "When I was growing up here, it was pretty much in the country and farmers would come into town to shop on Saturdays. And yet, we were close enough to Chicago to have all of the benefits of that city."

Perkins' body of work was recently recognized through a Village proclamation that quantified some 1,500 Glen Ellyn homes that he designed from the ground up or had a hand in remodeling.

The Glen Ellyn community extends its sincerest appreciation to Jerry Perkins for his innumerable contributions to the Village and congratulates him on being the first person named a "Glen Ellyn Living Legend" by the Glen Ellyn Historical Society.

Village Board Completes 20-Year Promise

In February 2007, the Village Board abated or reduced property taxes for the 20th consecutive year by \$500,000 or more. Since 1987, approximately \$10.3 million of property taxes have been eliminated.

It all began in 1987 with a pledge made by the Village Board prior to a successful \$15 million bond referendum.

The pledge included the abatement or removal of \$10 million in property taxes over the 20-year life of the bonds. The Board committed to using funds from other current revenue streams to pay for the abatements and keep \$10 million off the property tax bills. By the time the most recent annual property tax abatement occurred in 2007, the Village had abated a total of \$10.3 million in property taxes — exceeding the original commitment of \$10 million and completing the promise made by the Village Board more than two decades ago.

Municipal governments generally do not allow a single Village Board to dictate

the actions of future Village Boards. Completing this commitment, therefore, is unique. Six Village Presidents and eleven different Village Boards have continued to honor this promise — even during those periods when there were overriding financial concerns. Although there was no obligation of future Boards to uphold this plan, they felt it was the "right thing to do."

Taking the pledge a step further, the current Village Board abated property taxes in the amount of \$430,000 for fiscal year 2008. This was done because the original 1987 bond series extended over a 21-year period, the first year being an interest-only payment. Even though the pledge has been fully met, the last payment on these bonds is not due until FY08/09, therefore, an additional abatement was needed to prevent a one-time spike in property taxes stemming from these bonds. Once the bonds have been paid off over the next year, the Village will have abated a total of \$10.7 million in property taxes.

Village Receives Grant for Historic Preservation Efforts

The Village of Glen Ellyn, a Certified Local Government under the National Historic Preservation Act, recently received a \$14,000 grant from the state to conduct the next phase of a survey of historic structures in north central Glen Ellyn. This grant will provide for an intensive architectural resources survey that will complement surveys previously conducted in other areas of the Village. The data collected will be used for future planning and for local landmark and National Register of Historic Places nominations.

STREET RECONSTRUCTION - Complete rebuilding of the roadway with either concrete or asphalt

TYPE IA RESURFACING - Spot curb repairs; removal and replacement of asphalt surface

TYPE IB RESURFACING - More extensive spot curb repairs; removal and replacement of asphalt surface

TYPE IC RESURFACING - Curb installation or replacement on one side only; base repair; replacement of asphalt surface; special drainage or construction considerations

TYPE II RESURFACING - Enhanced roadway repair efforts featuring total curb and driveway approach replacement, a greater level of base repair than Type I, and removal and replacement of the asphalt surface

TYPE IIA REHABILITATION - Full curb replacement; most driveway approaches will be replaced; more extensive parkway restoration; removal and replacement of asphalt surface and replacement of the base

Vehicle Stickers and Dog Licenses Must be Renewed by April 30



Vehicle sticker fees, which help to pay for the maintenance of Village roads, among other things, are now available for purchase at the Civic Center. If you have expired stickers or your vehicle stickers expire on April 30, 2008, you must purchase and display a new sticker on your car by midnight, April 30th. If you purchased a multi-year sticker, your renewal application will reference which vehicles do not require a new sticker by noting "Paid through ..." for the appropriate cars. All vehicles registered to a Glen Ellyn address, including leased vehicles, company cars, and vehicles kept outside of the Village, such as for college students, are required to purchase and display a current Glen Ellyn vehicle sticker.

There are several ways to purchase your vehicle stickers. It is recommended that you use the pre-printed renewal form, mailed to all Village residences mid-March, and return it using the pre-addressed envelope. If you need a new form or have not received your application, you may obtain a form online at www.glenellyn.org or during normal business hours at the Cashier's Office located on the first floor of the Civic Center.

Once you've completed your application, you may drop off your application in the Village's collection box, located in front of the Civic Center, or purchase your stickers in person at the Cashier's Office. The Cashier's Office is open for window transactions Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., with extended hours on Thursday evenings until 7 p.m. The Cashier's Office will also be open Saturday, April 26, from 9 a.m.-12 p.m. and Wednesday, April 30, until 7 p.m. The Police Desk sells stickers after normal business hours.

The due date to purchase a current sticker is Wed., April 30, 2008. Note: a new sticker will not be issued unless all prior year stickers have been purchased. Beginning May 1, late fees of \$5 per month up to a maximum of \$30 will be assessed for each vehicle that has an expired registration. Failure to display a current sticker incurs a fine of \$50.

Save yourself time & money!!! Purchase a three-year sticker at a discounted rate. Renew only once until 2011.

In addition, dog licenses must be purchased by April 30. Applications are included with the vehicle sticker renewal form sent to all households. For more information about vehicle stickers and dog license applications, please call the Cashier's Office at 630-547-5235.



Rapid Reminders

- 9-1-1 is not just for emergencies. Remember to call 9-1-1 whenever you need to see a police officer.
- Building and excavation permits — designed to protect your family and property — are required for many building projects, including fences, driveways, decks, accessory structures, interior remodeling, heating and air-conditioning equipment, sewer and water service repair, electrical and plumbing work, swimming pools and lawn sprinkler systems, to name a few.
