## Village Mourns the Passing of Trustee Sara Lee

The Glen Ellyn community is deeply saddened by the recent death of Village Trustee Sara Lee, who had served on the Village Board since 2005. Sara passed away on May 26 after a brief battle with cancer.

Known throughout the community for her volunteer work, Sara not only served on the Village Board, but had numerous other volunteer positions as well, including service on the DuPage County Regional Office of the Education Advisory Board, Citizens Advisory Council for Glenbard South High School and Glen Ellyn League of Women Voters. Additional volunteer efforts included support of successful referendums for School Districts 87 and 89, president of the Raintree Homeowner's Association and participation in Glen Ellyn Vision 2000 and St. Petronille's School Parent Organization.

Sara's Village government roles included membership on the Comprehensive Plan Advisory Committee in 2001 and appointment to the Plan Commission in 2003. She also served on Glen Ellyn's Civic Betterment Party Nominating Committee.



Sara will be remembered as a warm, vibrant and dedicated woman who brought a wide mix of talents to her role as a civic leader. The Village officials and staff extend their condolences to her husband, Chip, and their three children, Jennifer, Peter and Jonathan.

## Residents Provide Feedback on Downtown

Glen Ellyn's Downtown Planning Study — designed to identify opportunities in the downtown — went into high gear in early June when Town Builder Studios, the Village's Downtown Strategic Plan Consultant, moved into a vacant commercial space at 476 Main St., generously made available by Costello Jewelers, and created a design studio. The purpose of the design studio was to enable residents to provide input about the future direction of Glen Ellyn's Central Business District. The design studio was part of a successful, three-day event in the downtown that included two Town Hall Meetings.



Over 40 suggested plans for the downtown were developed during the event, with input from Village residents. The various plans were put on display for public review at the second Town Hall Meeting. Consultants also summarized the main themes reoccurring in many of the plans, which related to parking, traffic circulation, green space, redevelopment and train station ideas.

Town Builder Studios will be using the information that was gathered — including survey and general comment forms and any additional data gathered prior to the three-day event — in order to develop two different plans for the downtown.

The conceptual plans should be complete by early July, when they will be presented to the Downtown Advisory Committee for review and discussion. Watch for another Town Hall meeting this fall, when the public will be able to review and comment on the developed plans.

#### **Fireworks**



## Lincoln Programs in July and August

The Lincoln Bicentennial Coalition of DuPage County was organized in January 2008 to bring together people and organizations from the DuPage area who are interested in planning and supporting events during the next 18 months in celebration of Abraham Lincoln's 200th birthday: February 12, 2009.

On Friday, July 25, at the Glen Ellyn History Center, 800 N. Main Street, author Cynthia Ogorek gives a program about her book, "The Lincoln Highway Around Chicago." There is no admission charge and the author will sign copies of her book. Refreshments are served as part of the evening's events. Doors open at 7 p.m. and Ogorek will take the audience on a journey along the "Lincoln Highway," using photographs, newspaper clippings and journals collected over a ten-year period. The highway itself was the creation of Carl Fisher, an Indianapolis businessman, who, in 1914, realized it was the straightest, most efficient route between Manhattan borough, New York City, and San Francisco, California. The road bypassed Chicago long before super highways were developed.

Additionally, on August 23, during the Festival of the Arts, the 97th Regimental Band will present a band concert on the grounds of Lake Ellyn Park, sponsored by the Lincoln Bicentennial Coalition.

A Lincoln fan/mask has been created by the Society and will be offered free of charge the night of the Lincoln Highway program, as well as at the Festival of the Arts and the Farmers' Markets on Friday, July 11, August 1 and August 15.

## Check with Planning and Development on Landscaping Plans

As you prepare for landscaping work this growing season, remember that there are zoning and building regulations that can affect your plans and may require you to obtain a building permit. These regulations apply to grade changes, stormwater drainage changes, fencing retaining wall heights and setbacks, and paver areas and setbacks, to name a few.

To determine if your plan conflicts with regulations or if you need a permit, please diagram the work on a copy of your property Plat of Survey for a concept review. Staff members in Glen Ellyn's Planning & Development Department will review your diagram at the service counter and advise you of any potential problems, make suggestions for compliance or assist in your permit application. ## Summer 2008 Construction Project Update

*Construction work will take place in the following areas this construction season.*

### Projects Underway

- **Parkside / Summerdale Roadway Reconstruction** - Work is progressing on this major infrastructure improvement project taking place within the boundaries of Roosevelt Rd., Main St., Fairview Ave. and Park Blvd. The scope of work includes new water mains, sanitary sewer rehabilitation, various storm drainage improvements, the reconstruction of Parkside, Summerdale, Maiden Ln. and the alley north of Roosevelt Rd., and resurfacing of Dorset, Forest and Park Plaza. This project is anticipated to be completed by October 2008.
- **Montclair Parking Lot** - The commuter parking lot, located on the south side of the railroad tracks between Park and Montclair, is being completely reconstructed, with upgrades to the Illinois Prairie Path and decorative street lighting between Park and Taylor. The project is expected to be completed by the Fourth of July holiday weekend. Work on the eastern two-thirds of the lot is substantially completed and open for use.
- **2008 Street Improvements** - Work is underway for various improvements on nine different street segments located primarily in the north and central sections of Glen Ellyn. A total of nearly two miles of roadway rehabilitation will be undertaken, including sections of Elm, Pennsylvania, Kenilworth, Glenwood, Melrose, Forest, Phillips, Sheffield and Kenilworth Court. The scope of work on each street varies from concrete pavement patching to asphalt resurfacing to full street reconstruction. Construction completion is expected around Labor Day.

### Project Recently Awarded

- **Saddlewood Lift Station Abandonment** - A contract was awarded for a project to install a new gravity sewer on the north side of St. Charles Rd. between Saddlewood Dr. and Newton Ave. Once the new sewer is installed, the existing wastewater lift station can be taken out of service. Work is scheduled to begin in mid-July.

### Projects in Final Design

Engineering for the following projects is nearly complete and work will be bid soon. Construction is anticipated for late summer and fall of 2008.

- **Surrey Drive and Braeside Area Improvements** - Improvements for this project include new water main and roadway reconstruction on Surrey Dr. between Roosevelt and Briar and the lining of sanitary sewers throughout the Braeside subdivision, located east of I-355 and north of Roosevelt Rd.
- **Park/Glen Ellyn Place/Prairie Project** - Project scope includes the resurfacing of Glen Ellyn Place and a portion of Park north of the railroad tracks to Pennsylvania, with the reconstruction of the balance of the Park corridor to Hawthorne and a section of Prairie between Cottage and Hawthorne.
- **Kenilworth Basin Improvements** - Replacement storm sewer is planned for Kenilworth Ave. between Linden and Oak.
- **Essex Court Improvements** - This work includes major stormwater management improvements, as well as reconstruction of the roadway.

## Cut Down on Mosquito Breeding Sites

Residents are reminded to eliminate all standing water on their property which can be a breeding ground for mosquitoes. One of the dangers posed by mosquitoes is the possibility of contracting West Nile Virus. In 2006, a death occurred in Glen Ellyn due to West Nile Virus. Appropriate measures should always be taken to use insect repellent and remove any containers of water that could serve as a breeding ground for mosquitoes. Every 7-10 days, new mosquitoes can be produced in stagnant water. To eliminate this problem:



- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles or any container holding water
- Fill in or drain any low places (puddles, ruts) in yard
- Keep gutters, drains, ditches and culverts free of weeds and trash, so water drains properly
- Cover trash containers to keep out rain water
- Repair leaky pipes and outdoor faucets
- Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week and store indoors when not in use
- Make sure your backyard pool is cared for while on vacation
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or concrete
- Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least weekly
- Keep grass cut short and shrubbery well trimmed around the house, so adult mosquitoes can't hide there

The Glen Ellyn Mosquito Abatement District patrols public lands to control mosquitoes. The Mosquito Abatement District is separate from Village government, and can be reached at 630-469-4085. ## Funding of Street Improvement Program

The Glen Ellyn Capital Improvements Commission (CIC) will be hosting public forums this year to inform residents about the status and funding of the Village's Long-Term Street Improvement Program. Now reaching the mid-point of its original 20-year timeframe, the Street Improvement Program has resulted in the rehabilitation of nearly 45 miles of roadways since 2001. Increasing construction costs, however, coupled with necessary upgrades in the required scope of work, have jeopardized the full implementation of the plan as originally conceived. Watch for future updates regarding the CIC's outreach program for Village roadway improvements.

# Tree Pest Alert!



Infestations threaten the health of the Village's trees. The Emerald Ash Borer has killed millions of trees in neighboring states. Gypsy Moths, as well, can defoliate a tree in a matter of days. Both of these insects have been spotted in or near Glen Ellyn. In addition, Oak Wilt has been found in Glen Ellyn, a fungus which can kill many species of oak trees. The Village maintains a diversified stock of public trees to avoid a significant loss of tree species to threats old and new. Use the following information to help prevent the spread of these infestations within our community.



## Watch for Signs of Emerald Ash Borer

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) is an invasive insect that has killed 20 million trees in Michigan and was recently discovered north of Glen Ellyn.

The Village of Glen Ellyn has over 1,900 parkway ash trees — approximately 13 percent of the total parkway tree population. Using formulas developed by the Council of Tree & Landscape Appraisers, the value of these ash trees is estimated to be \$7.1 million.

### What the Village is doing:

- The Village will be removing ash trees that are in poor to fair condition, but not all parkway ash trees.
- To protect healthy ash trees, a chemical treatment will be used on some ash trees that are in very good condition.
- The Village is participating in the Illinois Department of Agriculture Purple Trap Program. Sixteen purple traps will be installed throughout the Village. If an emerald ash borer is present, it will be attracted to the trap. (If you see these traps, please do not touch them. They must be left alone to work.)

### What residents can do:

- This insect is spread through the movement of infected firewood. Please do not bring firewood into Illinois from other states — only purchase it from a local source.
- If you think you may have an infected ash tree, contact an arborist immediately to have the tree inspected. If the presence of EAB is confirmed, please contact the Illinois Department of Agriculture, in addition to the Public Works Department at 630-469-6756.
- All tree care companies and landscapers should file a compliance agreement with the Department of Agriculture, which means they understand the consequences of this insect and agree with the regulations set forth. If you hire a company, ask if they have signed this agreement.

## Watering Trees Helps Ward Off Gypsy Moth Infestation

Gypsy Moth infestations have been found in Glen Ellyn over the past few years. Gypsy Moths can defoliate a tree in a matter of days, leading to stress and possibly death, if defoliated year-after-year. A wide variety of trees are susceptible to Gypsy Moths.

The caterpillars are present May through mid-June — when they feed on the leaves of trees and do the most damage. Adult Gypsy Moths emerge from the pupa in 10-14 days and are present from July through August. Females have white to cream-colored wings, a tan body, a 2" wingspan and are flightless. Males are smaller and dark brown, with a 1 to 1-1/2 inch-long wingspan and feathery antennae. Both males and females have an inverted v-shape that points to a dot on the wing.

Gypsy Moths will not usually kill a tree from one year's defoliation, but if the tree is defoliated several years in a row, it may die. If your trees were infested with Gypsy

Moths this year, it is recommended to keep those trees watered throughout the hot summer months. Watering is one of the most important things you can do to keep your trees healthy. Fertilizing in fall is also recommended.

In the past, the State of Illinois paid to spray for Gypsy Moths in Glen Ellyn, but no longer provides such funding. Limited Village dollars are currently dedicated to developing a response to protect some portion of the ash tree population from the imminent ash borer threat, but funding for Gypsy Moth spraying will continue to be sought.

## Oak Wilt Threatens Trees

Oak Wilt has been detected in Glen Ellyn in the areas bordering Crescent Blvd., Roger Rd., the railroad tracks and Lee St. This is a serious disease that can kill many species of oak trees. Oak Wilt is caused by a fungus that invades the water-conducting system of a tree and interferes with the normal water flow. In most cases, oak trees that contract Oak Wilt die within a short period of time. Red, pin and black oak are most affected, with white, bur and swamp oak being less susceptible to the disease.

### Spread of Oak Wilt

Oak Wilt moves from tree to tree in two ways: 90% of the spread occurs by root graft, with infected tree roots intertwining with a healthy tree. The other 10% of the spread occurs when beetles carry the fungus and bore into a healthy tree.

### Symptoms

Symptoms usually progress from the top of the tree downward. Generally the leaves at the top of the tree turn a dull green, then tan, then wilt and start falling. This typically occurs from late June to early July. As the disease progresses, individual leaves quickly discolor, taking on a bronzed appearance. The discoloration progresses around the margins of the leaf from the tip to the base. Leaves fall rapidly as the disease progresses. Trees can defoliate within a few weeks from the onset of symptoms.

### Diagnosis and Management

There are two ways to contain the disease: 1) provide a root graft barrier by trenching between the infected tree and healthy trees, and 2) remove the infected tree as soon as possible. For healthy trees, an arborist can inject a chemical that will help protect the tree from the disease.

As a precautionary measure, no pruning of oak trees should occur between April and October. The beetle that carries the fungus is attracted to freshly cut wood. Any firewood from an infected tree that is kept must have the bark peeled off.

Please watch for Oak Wilt symptoms in your neighborhood. If you think a public tree may have the symptoms, contact the Public Works Department at 630-469-6756. For trees on private property, contact a professional arborist immediately. If the tree tests positive for Oak Wilt disease, please contact the Public Works Department.

## Pamper Yourself at Local Businesses

# Rapid Reminders

- **Remember to water trees** during dry conditions.
- Residents are reminded that Village ordinance requires that you **clean up after your dog on public property, sidewalks and parkways.** Dogs must also be on a leash when not on their own property and should never be permitted to run off of private property when pedestrians walk by. Also, frequent barking is a violation of Village ordinance.
- **If you experience a power outage,** please contact ComEd at 800-334-7661.
- As the growing season continues, **please keep grass and weeds cut to less than 8".** Also, residents are asked to trim private property tree limbs and shrubs that overhang sidewalks or parkways so they do not pose safety hazards. If parkway trees need to be trimmed, please call the Public Works Department at 630-469-6756.
- **Residents whose refuse was out by 7 a.m.** on the Monday collection day, but was missed, should contact Allied Waste at 630-469-1036 before 12 Noon on Tuesday to ensure that they will return on Tuesday for the missed pickup. If you do not call prior to Noon, Allied Waste will not return until the following week.
- **Summer watering restrictions are now in effect.** Homes with even-numbered addresses may only water on even-numbered dates and homes with odd-numbered addresses may only water on odd-numbered dates.
- **New vehicle stickers should have been purchased by April 30, 2008.** If you have not purchased your vehicle stickers, late fees apply and you may be ticketed. Remember, when you sell your house, the Village will collect all late fees and fines, including those for past vehicle stickers not purchased.
