

Downtown Study Moves into Second Phase

Town Builder Studios (TBS), the Village's Downtown Strategic Plan consultant, has completed the first part of its study of Glen Ellyn's Central Business District. The purpose of the study is to identify possible opportunities for the downtown area.

This first phase of data collection and analysis, which took place over a period of several months, involved gathering input from residents and businesses through in-person interviews, surveys and feedback forms, a Town Hall Meeting and an open house "design studio." The design studio was held over three days in a downtown commercial space and

gave members of the community the opportunity to offer suggestions about the future direction of Glen Ellyn's Central Business District.

Using the information gathered, TBS has compiled an overview of their findings, which is being reviewed by the Downtown Advisory Committee (DAC), a 15-member ad hoc group of residents and business owners appointed by the Village Board to assist with the plan.

Following the DAC's review, TBS will move on to the next phase of the study — preparation of recommended plans. The draft plans will then be reviewed by the DAC and presented to the public at a Town Hall Meeting and open house this fall.

Fire Company Fund Drive and Open House



The Volunteer Fire Company's annual fund drive will begin in October. Donations made each year by Glen Ellyn residents and businesses help pay for firefighting and mechanical gear, vehicles and other life-saving equipment.

To help kick off this annual appeal, the Glen Ellyn Volunteer Fire Company will hold an open house on Saturday, October 4, from 10 a.m. - 1 p.m., and Monday, October 6, from 7 - 9 p.m., as part of Fire Prevention Week. Saturday's event will be held at the downtown fire station located at Main St. and Pennsylvania Ave., while the Monday evening event will be held at both fire stations: the downtown fire station and the south side fire station at 681 Taft Ave. Firefighting equipment will be on display and fire safety educational material will be available. Attendees will



also have the opportunity to speak with members of the Fire Company.

For the fund drive, residents are asked to make a tax-deductible contribution of \$95 per household and businesses are asked to contribute \$190.

Public Meetings to Address Funding for Street and Storm Sewer Program

September 9 and 17, 7:30 p.m., Glen Ellyn Civic Center

In 2000, voters approved a bond referendum for the Village's Street and Storm Sewer Improvement Program. This program was designed to correct drainage systems prone to flooding and to improve the condition of Glen Ellyn's roadways through a more aggressive 20-year cycle of repair, rather than the former 30-year cycle. In previous community opinion surveys, residents had expressed dissatisfaction with the condition of their neighborhood streets.

While the Village has undertaken 17 storm sewer improvement projects and rehabilitated over 40 miles of the Village's 82 miles of roadways, certain streets still need repairs and/or resurfacing. Between 2003 and 2007, however, construction costs have risen by over 40 percent, necessitating

a reevaluation of funding for this program.

The Village's preferred solution uses revenues freed up from retiring bond issues to address this shortfall in projected construction costs. This proposal is not anticipated to add significantly to the tax burden of residents.

To answer questions and address resident concerns, the Village of Glen Ellyn will hold public meetings at 7:30 p.m. on September 9 and 17 on the third floor of the Glen Ellyn Civic Center, 535 Duane St. A *Special Report* about the Street and Storm Sewer Program was also mailed to residents in late August. 

Halloween Safety Tips

Suggested Trick-or-Treating hours are 3 - 7 p.m. By following some simple precautions, Halloween can be a fun and safe time for all.

- ☛ Wear light-colored clothing that's short enough to prevent tripping and add reflective tape to the sides, front and back of costume.
- ☛ Make sure children can see well through face masks or use cosmetics to create masks.
- ☛ Adults should accompany young children.
- ☛ Go out in daylight and carry a flashlight in case of delay.
- ☛ Stay within your neighborhood and only visit homes you know.
- ☛ Only give and accept wrapped or packaged candy.
- ☛ Examine all candy before allowing children to eat it.
- ☛ Avoid hard plastic or wood props, such as daggers or swords. Substitute with foam rubber.



Melodrama Highlight of Tavern Day Celebration, September 21

On Sunday, September 21, 1 - 5 p.m., Stacy's Corners (at Main St. and Geneva Rd. in Glen Ellyn) will be transformed into "Tavern Day," an 1890s autumn celebration. Many of the activities, which will be on the grounds of Stacy's Tavern Museum and the areas surrounding the Glen Ellyn History Center at 800 N. Main St., are free to the public. Enjoy a realistic experience of "Life in the 1890s" that includes fun for every age group, as well as complimentary refreshments — lemonade and homemade cookies prepared by the famous Historical Society pie and pastry bakers.

2008 ARC Traveling Trophy Design Award and Vivian Ball Landscape Award

Each year, the Architectural Review Commission (ARC) evaluates and awards projects that reflect excellence in community appearance. The Traveling Trophy Award recognizes building design and the Vivian Ball Landscape Award recognizes outdoor beautification. The winners are selected based on how the improvements promote compatible and attractive enhancements to the community and conform to the Village's appearance guidelines.

The Traveling Trophy Award is given annually to a new development or renovation to a commercial building completed in the previous year. The winner is selected based on how the improvements and building serve to promote a cohesive design. The Village congratulates Potbelly Sandwich Works, 552 Roosevelt Rd., for receiving the Traveling Trophy Award. Potbelly was chosen as an excellent example of the reuse of an existing building with a compatible addition.



In addition, Honorable Mention was given to Napa Auto Parts, 40 Baker Hill Dr., for their flexibility in design and ability to work with the Village on a structure that is compatible with Village appearance guidelines. Honorable Mention was also given to Richard Somolik for the renovation of 481-483 Main St. — the location of Flour Barrel Bakery and the Renaissance Art Gallery. The judges considered this to be an outstanding improvement to an existing structure.

The Vivian Ball Landscape Award was established in 2000 in the memory of Vivian Ball who was active in Village beautification. The 2008 Vivian Ball Landscape Award was given to Danby Crossing Shopping Center on Roosevelt Rd. for their extensive parking lot and foundation plantings. They also created public amenities, such as sitting areas and a pavillion, and coordinated their landscaping and fencing with the Village's Roosevelt Rd. streetscape plan.

The Digital TV Transition *Will your TV work after February 17, 2009?*

Broadcast television stations are currently undergoing a transition from analog to digital mode, a change that can affect individuals using antennas to receive free, over-the-air television programming, versus cable or satellite hookups. This digital TV (DTV) transition will be complete by February 17, 2009. If you have free, over-the-air television only, your television may no longer receive broadcast channels after this date.

A digital television (available in stores now) will allow you to continue to watch free over-the-air programming after February 2009. However, if you have an older television, it may be analog, and you will need an analog-to-digital converter box to continue to watch broadcast television. (Cable and satellite TV subscribers will not be affected by the February 2009 cut-off date.)

How do I Know if I Have an Analog TV?

Many DTVs and digital television equipment will have labels or markings on them, or statements in the informational materials that came with them, to indicate

that they contain digital tuners. These labels or markings may contain the words "Integrated Digital Tuner," "Digital Tuner Built-In," "Digital Receiver," "Digital Tuner," "DTV," "ATSC," or "HDTV" (High Definition television). If your television equipment contains any of these labels or markings, you should be able to view digital over-the-air programming without the need for an analog-to-digital converter box.

If your television set is labeled as a "Digital Monitor" or "HDTV Monitor," or as "Digital Ready" or "HDTV Ready," it may not contain a digital tuner. If your television set is labeled as "analog" or "NTSC," and is NOT labeled as containing a digital tuner, it contains an analog tuner only.

If you cannot determine whether your television set or other television equipment contains a digital tuner, you are advised to check your equipment for the manufacturer name and model number, and then contact your consumer electronics retailer, or the manufacturer,

to determine whether it contains a digital tuner. This information also may be available online through the manufacturer's website.


By law, all television reception devices (TVs, VCRs, DVRs, etc.) purchased by retailers after March 2008 for sale in their store were mandated to contain a digital tuner. Retailers, however, are permitted to sell analog devices from existing inventory, but are required to display a notice on or near the device indicating that it contains an analog broadcast tuner.



To help consumers with the DTV transition, the government established the Analog-to-Digital Converter Box Coupon Program. Every U.S. household is eligible to receive up to two coupons, worth \$40 each, toward the purchase of eligible analog-to-digital converter boxes at participating retailers. Emerald Ash Borer Close to Glen Ellyn

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) is an invasive insect that has killed millions of ash trees in Michigan and has now been found within one mile of Glen Ellyn. In cooperation with the Illinois Department of Agriculture, the Village is participating in a program whereby ash borer traps are being placed on parkway trees throughout the community. (These traps can be identified by their purple color.) The traps contain an oil attractant to lure the beetle if it is already in the area, but will not attract the ash borer to an uninfected site. Residents are asked not to touch the traps, but if one has fallen or become misplaced, please call Public Works immediately at 630-469-6756.



What you can do:

- This insect is spread through the movement of infected firewood.

Please do not bring firewood into Illinois from other states – only purchase it from a local source.

- If you think you may have an infected ash tree, contact an arborist immediately to have the tree inspected. If the presence of EAB is confirmed, please contact the Illinois Department of Agriculture, in addition to the Public Works Department at 630-469-6756.
- All tree care companies and landscapers should file a compliance agreement with the Department of Agriculture, which means they understand the consequences of this insect and agree with the regulations set forth. If you hire a company, ask if they have signed this agreement.

Gypsy Moths in Sections of Glen Ellyn

Gypsy Moths can defoliate a tree in a matter of days, leading to stress, and possibly death, if defoliated year-after-year. A wide variety of trees are susceptible to Gypsy Moths.

Gypsy Moth infestations have been found in some areas of Glen Ellyn for the second year in a row: between Crescent, Roger, Park Plaza and the railroad tracks and around Lake Ellyn. In addition, a small number were found this year on Revere Rd.

At this time of year, a Gypsy Moth infestation is evidenced by egg sacs that are tan or buff-colored and about 1-1/2" x 3/4" in size. They are found on patio furniture, trees and homes. These egg sacs can be scraped off and dropped into soapy water in order to limit the number that will hatch next year.

Gypsy Moths will not usually kill a tree from one year's defoliation, but if the tree is defoliated several years in a row, it may die. If your trees were infested with Gypsy Moths this year, it is recommended to keep those trees watered throughout the summer months. Watering is one of the most important things you can do to keep your trees healthy. Fertilizing in fall is also recommended.

Parkway Reforestation Program

The goal of the Village's Parkway Reforestation Program is to plant trees in open parkway spaces throughout the community. Planting occurs two times per year: in the spring and fall. Planting for the Village's Fall Reforestation Program is scheduled for October. Open parkway spots have already been identified for the October planting and trees have been selected. If you are interested in having a tree planted in the spring of 2009, however, please call Public Works for an inspection. Volunteer Profile: Len and Grace Swanson

Throughout their 40 years in Glen Ellyn, Len and Grace Swanson have made volunteering a significant part of their lives. When their three children were young, the Swansons volunteered for Indian Guides, Scout Troops and PTA. Later, Len served on the Zoning Board of Appeals and the Plan Commission where he recently finished his term of office. Grace was a member of the Library Board and served as its president in the late 1980s and early 1990s.

A retired trial lawyer, Len's interest in the law first led him to the Zoning Board of Appeals. "I wanted to learn about the process of zoning and planning," Len said. "I think people should consider their unique talents and interests and choose a commission accordingly."

Later, as a member of the Plan Commission, Len was involved with several high-profile projects, including new townhome projects and the Danby Crossing Shopping Center. "We had to evaluate things like density, traffic patterns, sidewalks and driveways, as well as entrances and exits."

"As commission members, we don't enact ordinances," Len continued, "but rather evaluate the project, hold a hearing

and make our recommendations to the Village Board, which makes the final determination."

Grace was elected to the Glen Ellyn Library Board when it was reviewing plans for a new public library and later served as its president. "We were involved in both the initial study and the construction phase," Grace said. Later she served on the District 41 School Board at a time when the school district was adding onto several of its schools to accommodate a growing student population. Today, Grace is president of the Glen Ellyn Library Foundation, which oversees an endowment for programs that enrich the library.

"I've been fortunate to have worked with many wonderful board members," Grace said. "They were great groups that jelled nicely — and also very diverse: young people, seniors, accountants, lawyers, housewives — there weren't many groups that weren't represented."

Grace stays active today by working as a Chicago Architecture Foundation docent. "I have an interest in architecture and need to find things to keep busy and out of trouble," she joked.

Len regularly shops for the Glen Ellyn



Food Pantry — one of several teams of individuals who assist the organization throughout the month. "After my retirement, I had stopped by the Senior Center at Grace Lutheran Church to get my senior citizen pass. The Food Pantry is located there as well and I stopped in and asked them if they needed help. I wanted to fill my time and keep active doing work I felt good about."

For others considering volunteering, the Swansons' advice is to get involved. "You always get more than you give in those situations," Grace said. "People just have to find their own niche."

Changes to PACE Bus Routes

Effective Monday, June 9, several PACE bus routes operating in DuPage County changed in order to extend routes to new areas, operate later hours on some routes, and strengthen service in areas with high demand.

Route 706 in southwest Glen Ellyn has been discontinued. Route 654 in south Glen Ellyn has been rerouted in some areas and select trips have been discontinued.

Rapid Reminders

- It is a violation of Village ordinance to rake leaves into the street. Leaves clog storm sewers and create dangerous driving conditions. Village street sweeping is also hindered when the streets are filled with leaves.

The best methods of leaf disposal are composting or mulching. You can also place the leaves in paper yard waste bags or reusable containers with Village yard waste stickers affixed. Yard waste – including leaves – is collected on the regular Monday garbage day. Yard waste stickers can be purchased from the Cashier’s Office or from several area stores. Go to www.glenellyn.org and look under “Services” for additional refuse information.
- To help prevent localized flooding, please be sure that storm drains in your neighborhood are clear of leaves and debris.
- October will be the last month for the monthly branch and brush collection. October pick-ups will take place:
—For both sides of Hill Ave. and north of Hill Ave., the second Tuesday of October, October 14.
—For south of Hill Ave., the third Monday of October, October 20.
- Weekly yard waste collection, with yard waste stickers affixed, will run through the end of November. Weekly yard waste pick-up, with stickers, will resume in April 2009.
- The Glen Ellyn Police Department reminds residents to keep homes and vehicles locked. Open vehicles provide an open invitation to thieves. Residents are reminded to keep vehicles locked even when they are in their own driveway. If you think someone has been in your vehicle, please call 9-1-1.
