Village Mourns Passing of Former Village Manager

It is with great sadness that the Village of Glen Ellyn announces the death of former Village Manager Gary Webster. Mr. Webster, 64, passed away on August 14, 2009, in Arizona, following a three-year battle with cancer. His passing comes as a tremendous loss to the Village he served for 22 years.

Mr. Webster, who retired as Glen Ellyn's Village Manager in 2006, also served in many other capacities during his 40-year career in public service. From 1979 to 1984 he served as the City Manager in Wood River, IL, and prior to that, in many capacities for the City of Pontiac, Michigan, where he worked from 1966 to 1979.

During more than two decades as Village Manager for Glen Ellyn, Mr. Webster served with six Village Presidents and 43 Trustees. Notable among his successes were the Baker Hill commercial development, the streets and sewer referendum and the Roosevelt Road and Stacy's Corners redevelopment projects. Mr. Webster is also recognized for his dedication to maintaining a fiscally responsible local government in Glen Ellyn.

The Village extends its deepest sympathies to his wife, Karen, and two children, Jordan and Adam. The Webster Family is planning a memorial service for the fall of 2009.



Village Board Continues Downtown Plan Discussion

The Downtown Strategic Plan has reached the final stages as the Village Board has begun to consider its adoption. The purpose of the Downtown Strategic Plan is to identify and guide development opportunities to improve the Village's downtown area. The Planning Study began in February 2008 when the Village hired consultant Town Builder Studios (TBS) to oversee the process.



Development of the Strategic Plan was guided by a Downtown Advisory Committee (DAC) comprised of volunteer members and representatives from various community organizations, downtown merchants and property owners. The planning process included a number of opportunities for public input, including

interviews, merchant surveys, a design studio, charette, town hall meetings, presentations, and paper and online public feedback surveys.

In March, the DAC unanimously recommended approval of the plan to the Village Board. A final draft of the plan was forwarded to the Board in June, and it was reviewed at the July 20 and August 17 Workshops.

At these Workshops, the Board listened to presentations, received additional public input and posed questions to Village staff and TBS. At its August 17 Workshop, the Board agreed that it would like to review the recommendations made in the plan in more detail before considering formal adoption. An additional Workshop, therefore, will be scheduled in the near

Volunteer Profile: New Student Commissioners



“I’m really proud to be part of a commission that’s looking to maintain the historic nature of the town,” said **Alex Cooper**, a Glenbard West High School student who

recently joined the Village’s Historic Preservation Commission.

For the last several years, Glen Ellyn high school students have been permitted to apply for one of the Village’s commissions.

“Glenbard West has a fantastic social studies department,” Alex said, “and that’s how I found out about the opportunity to be a commissioner. It’s a great way to represent the students’ voice. Some people think that teens are disinterested,” he continued, “but I know for a fact that that’s not true. Many students just don’t know how to go out and get their voice heard.”

For Alex, joining the Historic Preservation Commission was a perfect fit. Since he was a young boy, he’s been intrigued by the Village’s long and colorful history.

“In third grade we learned about [Deacon] Churchill coming and building his cabin here,” he said. “As I got older, I realized that Glen Ellyn has been around much longer than most of the other communities in the area. There’s so much here that’s important to maintain because it’s part of the historical integrity of the town.”

Alex is entering his senior year at Glenbard West this fall and plans to pursue political science in college in order to foster his interest in local government. During his high school career, he’s been involved in many volunteer activities, including the One Voice Outreach Choir

that performs at local convalescent homes. “We also talk with them — one of my favorite activities,” Alex said. “They tell us things we never would have learned. It’s been very rewarding.”



Julia Kinsey chose to apply for the Environmental Commission because it dovetails with her interests. She is entering her senior year at Glenbard West this fall and plans

to go into non-profit work after college. “I hope to organize and plan fun events that will raise awareness of urgent issues like the environment,” she said. “I want to educate and provide resources to the public in order to help people make a positive impact on the earth.”

Julia has found her experience on the Environmental Commission to be an eye-opening one.

“I didn’t realize how much work goes into every little thing the Village and commissions put together,” she said. “For the Recycling Extravaganza we held last spring, there were so many odds and ends that had to be taken care of in order to have the successful event that we had. Currently, we’re looking at the possibility of providing commercial recycling for the Village’s businesses. This would reduce Glen Ellyn’s carbon footprint immensely.”

In addition to her work on the commission, Julia volunteers at the Sunrise Senior Living Center and the SCARCE Environmental Learning Center, both located in Glen Ellyn.

“No matter how much I might just want to sleep on my couch for the rest of the day,” she said, “I never regret going out and volunteering. It’s incredibly rewarding because I know that I made a difference to someone or something. Plus, it’s really fun, too!”

Halloween Safety Tips

Suggested Trick-or-Treating hours are 3 - 7 p.m. By following some simple precautions, Halloween can be a fun and safe time for all.

- Wear light-colored clothing that’s short enough to prevent tripping, and add reflective tape to the sides, front and back of costume.
- Make sure children can see well through face masks or use cosmetics to create masks.
- Adults should accompany young children.
- Go out in daylight and carry a flashlight in case of delay.
- Stay within your neighborhood and only visit homes you know that are well-lit.
- Only give and accept wrapped or packaged candy.
- Examine all candy before allowing children to eat it.
- Avoid hard plastic or wood props, such as daggers or swords. Substitute with foam rubber.

New Building Permit Fees

Glen Ellyn's Village Board recently adopted a new ordinance applying to both commercial and residential construction projects, which increases some permit fees and adds new permit fees. These changes affect the cost of some applications, variations, approvals, building and plan review fees and inspections.

This is the Village's first comprehensive permit fee revision since 2003. It was based on a thorough analysis of actual Village costs, as well as an evaluation of fees assessed by neighboring communities.

Certain projects that formerly did not require building permits will now require one in order to ensure code compliance and reduce potential conflicts with adjacent property owners. Examples of these types of projects include driveway, patio and paving work that involves more than 100 square feet, as well as roofing and siding for 20 percent or more of the existing surface area. Grade changes

that disturb over 300 square feet of lot area would also now require a permit.

U.S. Census 2010: It's in Our Hands

Preparations have already begun for the U.S. Census 2010. The Census is a count of everyone living in the United States and its territories. This includes people of all ages, races, ethnic groups, both citizens and non-citizens.

The Census is important in determining the distribution of government funding for critical services. It is important that everyone participates to ensure the flow of money to our community.

Census questionnaires are scheduled to be mailed or delivered to households February through March 2010. The questionnaires

contain only a few questions and should only take a few minutes to complete.

Please remember that certain government funds provided to our community are based on population. Be sure to fill out and return the census form once you receive it and please be as accurate as possible with your answers.

Safeguard Bicycles

Although summer is nearly over, the season for bicycle theft is not. Below are a few tips for safeguarding your bicycle.

Lock your bike whenever visiting public places, such as the pool or library. Any lock is better than no lock! A thief may call attention to himself while attempting to defeat even the simplest, most inexpensive lock. Should you see someone tampering with a bicycle lock, call 9-1-1 immediately.



Record your bicycle serial number, brand, model and color. Store this information in a safe place in case you need to report a theft later. Tracking a bicycle by serial number is the best way to get the bicycle back to its owner.

You may also purchase a Village of Glen Ellyn bicycle sticker, so that your bicycle has another identifying number. Your contact information will be registered with the Glen Ellyn Police Department. The cost of each bicycle sticker is 50 cents and you may purchase one at anytime at the Glen Ellyn Police Department.

Conduct the Pledge of Allegiance at a Village Board Meeting

Architectural Resources Survey

**Results Presented
October 7**



Over the past several years, the Village has obtained three grants from the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency to conduct architectural resource surveys in the northern portions of Glen Ellyn.

The surveys have been performed for several reasons, among them: to encourage homeowners of historic homes to apply for placement of their home on the National Registry; to encourage homeowners to consider taking the steps to landmark their home within the Village; and to expand the Village's knowledge of existing historic homes.

The Village will host a neighborhood meeting to present the results of the two most recently completed surveys on Wednesday, October 7, at the Lake Ellyn Boathouse on Lake Ellyn, starting at 7 p.m.

Village Evaluating Video Gaming in Local Establishments

Community Feedback Sought

The Village of Glen Ellyn is in the process of gathering information to determine if video gaming should be allowed in the Village and is requesting resident and community feedback on video gaming and its potential impact on the Village.

The Video Gaming Act, enacted on July 13, 2009, legalizes the use of video gaming terminals in specific land locations in Illinois. A video gaming terminal is any electronic game machine in which cash is inserted and the player receives free games or credits that can be redeemed for cash. Video

gaming is allowed in licensed retail establishments where alcoholic liquor is served for consumption on the premises, such as a bar or restaurant. There may not be more than five machines on any premises and they may not be located within 100 feet of a school or a place of worship.

Severe Weather Sirens



Today, we commonly refer to Severe Weather Sirens as “Tornado Sirens.”

These sirens were initially designed to warn of air raids in World War II and were known as “Civil Defense Warnings.” They were later adapted to warn of nuclear attack and of natural phenomena, such as tornadoes. Over time, some municipalities have further refined the use of such devices with changes in tone and length of activations for different purposes.

In Glen Ellyn, sirens were once used to alert the Volunteer Fire Company of fires and other calls for service. Today, however, the Glen Ellyn sirens are activated in three different instances:

- Upon receipt of a tornado warning issued by the National Weather Service that names Glen Ellyn or one of the adjacent communities as being in the path of the storm.
- Upon notification by a Police Officer or Firefighter that they have observed a funnel cloud, either on the ground or aloft, which is within five miles of Glen Ellyn or any town that borders Glen Ellyn.

- Upon direction or order from a competent authority, such as The

Village President, Village Manager, member of the police department, firefighter, etc. This could include a severe storm event, but not necessarily a tornado.

Up until recently the sirens were tested every evening at 6 p.m. to ensure that they were in good working order. Today, the sirens are silently tested every Tuesday, and audibly on the first Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m.

Safeguarding our Smallest Passengers

Statistics have long demonstrated that seat belts save lives. Many of the tragic accidents that claim the lives of children could be prevented by making sure children are always properly restrained in safety seats, boosters or seat belts.

Infants should be secured in rear-facing infant seats. Older babies and toddlers should be restrained in front-facing seats, some of which convert to belt-positioning boosters for use until the child is big enough to use an adult seat belt.

National statistics show that in the vast majority of cases where an injured child was restrained, either the car seat was improperly installed or the child was improperly secured in the car seat.

The Village offers free child safety seat inspections to ensure car seats are correctly installed and will work properly in the event of an accident. To have a Glen Ellyn police officer inspect your child's car seat for proper installation, please call 630-469-1187 to set up an appointment.



Coffee with the Cops

In December 2007, the Glen Ellyn Police Department began a new public outreach initiative known as Coffee with the Cops. On the first Saturday morning of each month, the Chief of Police and/or the Deputy Chief(s) of Police play host to interested residents, giving them the opportunity to interact with law enforcement personnel in a non-enforcement environment. Participants can discuss neighborhood issues, such as traffic or parking; seek information on various police programs; and learn about specific police duties and responsibilities, such as investigations, traffic accident reconstructions and evidence collections. Coffee with the Cops sessions are held from 8 - 10 a.m. on the second floor of the Civic Center and pre-registration is not required to attend.

Rapid Reminders

■ **It is a violation of Village ordinance to rake leaves into the street.** Leaves clog storm sewers and create dangerous driving conditions. Village street sweeping is also hindered when the streets are filled with leaves.

The best methods of leaf disposal are composting or mulching. You can also place the leaves in paper yard waste bags or reusable containers with Village yard waste stickers affixed. Yard waste – including leaves – is collected on the regular Monday garbage day. Yard waste stickers can be purchased from the Cashier’s Office or from several area stores. Go to www.glenellyn.org and look under “Resources and Services” for additional information.

■ **To help prevent localized flooding,** please be sure that storm drains in your neighborhood are clear of leaves and debris.

■ **Snowplow drivers are needed for clearing Village streets** in the winter months. To apply, please call the Public Works Department at 630-469-6756.

■ **October will be the last month for the monthly branch and brush collection.** October pickups will take place:

— For both sides of Hill Ave. and north of Hill Ave., the second Monday of October, October 12.

— For south of Hill Ave., the third Monday of October, October 19.

■ **Weekly yard waste collection, with yard waste stickers affixed, will run through the end of November.** Weekly yard waste pick-up, with stickers, will resume in April 2010.

■ **The Glen Ellyn Police Department reminds residents to keep homes and vehicles locked.** Open homes and vehicles are an invitation to thieves. Residents are reminded to keep vehicles locked even when they are in their own driveway. If you think someone has been in your vehicle or home, please call 9-1-1.
